Many business customers are also interested in the bank's Positive Pay cash management service, which is designed to guard against mailbox theft, check copying and other scams that are predicted to increase in the current environment. "We're always focused on trying to find customized solutions to fit our customers' needs," Valerio says.

The Exeter Branch also is continuing to support Exeter Township through these difficult times. In addition to making ongoing donations to the Exeter Library and the Exeter Community Education Foundation, the branch is a strong supporter of the 10th annual Hack Away at Hunger Golf Tournament at The Reading Country Club this summer. The proceeds go to feed school-age children in Berks and Schuylkill counties.
