Tom was a very friendly and intelligent man. I remember all the in-depth discussions we had over the current events occurring in the world at the time. Tom was a gentleman of Irish descent who had a stroke and came to our center because his wife worked. He could talk the bark off a tree. Always upbeat and engaging he would entertain client and staff alike with his quick, witty humor, and friendly personality. He celebrated each holiday and you could always count on him to dress up for St. Patty's day and Halloween.





One of the most interesting clients we served was Mike C. Mike was a quiet man that really kept to himself. His daughter had mentioned he had an interest in working with wood and after doing some smaller creative projects, he moved on to doll house kits. Not the snap together, easy assembly variety; he

tackled the all wood, unpainted, 1000+piece by piece glue together kind. Mike would get a kit, lay everything out on his improvised workbench and go to work. Three or so months later, Mike would unveil his creation; truly works to be proud of. They were so good, all agreed to raffle them off to help offset the cost of the next doll house project Mike would tackle. Each successive house was larger and more elaborate than the predecessor.

If you drop by Bon Homie early in the morning, you will be greeted enthusiastically by Regina, a very happy, and pleasant, upbeat young woman. She has been part of our morning crew for over twenty years and knows the words to every song that comes on the radio. Regina is one of three clients that have been attending our program for over 20 years.
